Tractors, Trains & Shipwrecks - Yesteryear Recollections of Sonoma County

For a variety of reasons, it took many years to bring this collection of vintage tales to fruition. Former Sonoma County Farm Bureau president Donald R. Richardson passed away in 1983, but his daughter, Donna Richardson Robbins was determined, so Tractors, Trains & Shipwrecks – Yesteryear Recollections of Sonoma County will now be arriving in local bookstores this month, a collection christened "Tom Sawyer-like" by local historian & Press Democrat columnist Gaye LeBaron.

Spawned by his daughter receiving his handwritten stories recounting his youthful exploits while growing up in the seaside hamlet of Stewarts Point, these originals comprise Part 2 of the book. They are accompanied by vintage black & white photos dating back to Richardson's birth in 1914 which are sprinkled throughout, creating a unique experience for the reader of these step-back-in-time tales set in the 1920s, 30s & beyond.

An article entitled "Don Richardson Honored for Faithful Service to FB" from the Sonoma-Marin Farm News in the late 70's also appears in the book recounting his lengthy years of service to the organization. In addition to serving as president in the late 50's, he was also a delegate to the California Farm Bureau Federation's annual meeting a number of times and chaired the Timber Advisory Committee – a duty he was particularly well-suited for in light of his work as a professional forester and association with the SRJC's forestry program, activities he carried out in addition to his primary duties as a rancher. The article also highlights his nearly 50 years of service to the California Wool Grower's Association, both locally and statewide.


Current Farm Bureau President John Azevedo said, "this memoir of coastal

Owners Walt and Arleen Jacobsen, now both in their 90s, were born and raised in Petaluma, and have owned this cattle ranch since 1950. The land joins a stretch of 16 MALT-protected properties, filling in a permanent agricultural corridor running from the Marin-Sonoma county line northwest up Chileno Valley and southwest to Nicasio.

Strategic protection of large blocks of farmland and wildlife habitat is the surest way to counter the threats of loss and fragmentation. By protecting the Jacobsens' beautiful ranch, MALT is allowing both farming and wildlife to continue to thrive in our region.
