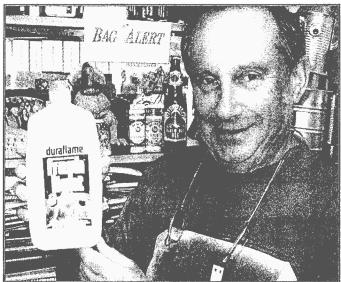

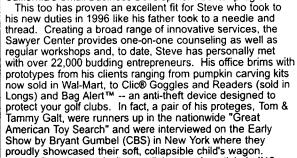
Not surprising then that after completing

shop featuring staff from the United States Patent Office. Invited as a guest on KGO-AM radio (ABC) to promote the 2day event, he was interviewed by Pete Wilson who was so engaged by Steve's regaling of stories of the Sawyer Center's creative clients and their myriad inventions that he contacted him 6 months later and asked him to come on the show again. Even after 8 years, Steve's enthusiasm is still demonstrably contagious -- a quality that continually invigorates and inspires the budding entrepreneurs he's dedicated to serving. The workshop itself also proved so popular that the USPTO staff has agreed to a repeat engagement, currently slated for Fall, 2004.

Unique in all the country, the innovative Sawyer Center, under Steve's stewardship and guidance, is dedicated to

creating jobs by assisting people in bringing their products and/or services to market just as Steve has successfully "invented" this 2nd career for himself. Steve Schneider and the Sawyer Center -- tailor made for each other indeed....
